Daily Schedule

8:30 - 8:45 AM: Arrival and Morning Routine

- Children arrive, put away their belongings, and engage in morning activities such as puzzles, drawing, or reading.
- 8:45: 9:00 AM: Circle Time
 - Class meeting to discuss the day's schedule, weather, and any special announcements. This time often includes a morning song or greeting.
- 9:00-10:00 AM: Literacy Block
 - Activities focused on reading, writing, and phonics. This may include a read-aloud session, small group work, and literacy centers
- 10:00 10:15 AM: Snack and Recess
 - Children have a snack and then go outside for recess to play and socialize.
- 10:15 -11:30 AM: Literacy Block
 - Activities focused on reading, writing, and phonics. This may include a read-aloud session, small group work, and literacy centers.
- 11:30 AM 12:30 PM: Lunch and Recess
 - Children eat lunch and have another recess period to play and relax.
- 12:30 12:45 PM: Quiet Time
 - A period for rest or quiet activities such as reading or drawing. This helps children recharge for the afternoon.
- 12:45 1:00 PM: Science/Social Studies
 - Lessons and activities related to science or social studies topics. This may include experiments, nature walks, or discussions about the community.
- 1:00-2:00 PM: Art/Music/Physical Education
 - Rotating activities that include art projects, music lessons, or physical education to develop creativity and physical skills.
- 2:00-2:30 PM: Closing Circle
 - A time to review the day, share experiences, and prepare for dismissal.
- 2:30 PM: Dismissal
 - Children gather their belongings and are dismissed to go home.

Arrival and Dismissal Procedures

Drop-Off Instructions

- Arrival Time Drop-off begins at 8:15 AM and ends at 8:30 AM. Please ensure your child arrives within this window.
- Drop-Off Zone Use the designated drop-off zone located at the front of the school. Look for the signs indicating the drop-off area.
- Safety First Ensure your child exits the vehicle on the curbside to avoid traffic.

Pick-Up Instructions

- Pick-Up Time Pick-up begins at 2:30 PM and ends at 2:45 PM. Please arrive within this time frame.
- Pick-Up Zone Use the same designated zone as drop-off. Look for the signs indicating the pick-up area.
- Display Identification Have authorized persons picking your child up ready to display identification to help staff quickly identify them.
- Safety First Ensure your child enters the vehicle on the curbside to avoid traffic.

Emergency Plan and Policy

In case of emergency, Echen Kindergarten has an emergency preparedness kit. This kit contains enough emergency supplies to take care of all the children and the staff for 72 hours. Educators will take all reasonable precautions to ensure your child's safety should a fire or other emergency occur. Annual and monthly evacuation drills are held with the children and emergency bags are part of each program's equipment. Please familiarize yourself with the emergency plan posted in your program. Do not enter the building if you arrive during an emergency evacuation. (Drill or Real) The muster point for the school age program is the garbage bin on the corner of the school grounds. (610 Wade Ave).

Emergency Evacuation Procedures

In the event of an emergency that requires us to evacuate the daycare, we will take our emergency kit and all the children to our emergency meeting place, the dumpster bin on the corner of the property location. We will illicit help from additional staff to walk the children to the meeting place when available. Our priority is to get them away from the danger as safely as possible.

Each child will have an emergency contact card, with the child's name, medical number, emergency contact numbers, and contact names. This is brought along anytime the children leave the building so parents can be called when needed as soon as possible.

Our emergency plan will be tested at least once a year, with fire drills monthly to the same meeting location every time.

Power Outage Policy

If the power should be out during the hours of operation and stays off for more than 30 minutes, parents will be called to come pick up their children. Staff will remain till all the children are picked up.

Winter cut-off (including wind chill

Exercise, fresh air, vitamin D, these are all important reasons to make sure we are getting outdoors even in the winter. Getting kids outdoors and active in winter can be immune boosters, so please send your children prepared to go out. Temperatures at -15c educators will use their discretion regarding the length of time outside. Wind gusts, sunshine and how the children are doing will all play an important factor. Should the temperature reach -36c or lower during the program hours the center might be closed that day for safety reasons. All families will be notified when this happens as soon as possible.

Bus routine for afterschool care during wintertime is treated as their outside time due to it getting dark earlier in the evening and it is unsafe for the children and educators when they can't see anything.

Summer cut-off (including humidex)

During the hotter months we ask parents to ensure that their child has a water bottle ready to go outside with them, as well as appropriate clothing as we will be outside lots. However, if the temperature readings are between +25c and +28c, educators will use their discretion, such as limiting time in sun, seek shade, offer water, and water play, etc. when the temperature reaches hotter than +28c the children and educators will remain indoors. Should temperatures reach +36c or higher during program hours might be closed that day for safety reasons. All parents will be notified when this happens as soon as possible.

We also exercise caution during forest fire season and air quality is poor. All children will remain indoors when air quality is 7 or higher. Children will not go outside if wind gusts exceed 65km/hr as posted for our local area.

The use of sunscreen is encouraged throughout the year as weather dictates. Parents are asked to apply sunscreen to their child in the morning and educators will reapply it in the afternoon.

(if the parent has signed permission form) A bottle of sunscreen can be labeled and kept at the center. *Please check expiry dates on the sunscreen*.

Weather and temperature policy

We believe it is important for children to play outside. We play outside in all weather conditions, except for extreme heat, cold, poor air quality, or lighting storms. Also, assuming the children are appropriately dressed for the occasion as we don't want to make them sick.

Safety/ Health: policies and procedures!

These policies and procedures have been developed to provide the highest level of health protection for all the children and staff.

We ask for your full co-operation with the following:

- Diarrhea may be a symptom of a serious illness; therefore, we require that your child remain away from the program for a minimum of 24 hours after the last bout of diarrhea.
- Vomiting: Health policies state that if your child has been vomiting, they must stay away from childcare for a minimum of 24 hours after the last bout of vomiting.
- Cold/Flu: Please do not bring your child if they have or are developing an acute cold with fever, green discharge runny nose and eyes, sneezing, coughing, or sore throat. A communicable disease, parasite skin infection, discharge from eyes, or an undiagnosed rash, an intestinal or stomach disorder with vomiting and or diarrhea, or a fever over 100 F or 38C.

Insufficient recuperation time can leave a child with very low immunity levels and increases their susceptibility to secondary infections. If your child has had any infectious disease or is exhibiting any of these symptoms outlined above, the program staff may request that your child be examined by a doctor or receive medical clearance before re-entering the program.

Please notify staff of any medications being given out to your child outside of program hours. If your child must be taken for an emergency and you cannot be contacted this information may be of critical importance.

Medicine can be administered by our staff if our medication consent form has been filled out and reviewed by the manager. Please ask educators for a form if medication is required.

Please stay home from kindergarten if you have the following:

- Flu
- Hand foot and mouth
- Chickenpox/shingles
- Head lice
- Impetigo
- Croup
- Pink eye
- Strep infections
- Early cold symptoms

Curriculum Overview

Our kindergarten curriculum is designed to provide a well-rounded educational experience that supports the development of the whole child. Throughout the year, students will engage in a variety of subjects and activities that promote cognitive, social, emotional, and physical growth. Here are the key subjects and topics covered:

Language Arts

Students will develop foundational literacy skills through activities such as reading, writing, listening, and speaking. They will explore phonics, vocabulary, and comprehension strategies, and engage in storytelling and creative writing. Indigenous stories and oral traditions will be included to enrich their understanding of diverse cultures.

Mathematics

Our math curriculum focuses on number sense, counting, basic addition and subtraction, shapes, patterns, and measurement. Hands-on activities and manipulatives help children understand mathematical concepts in a concrete way.

Science

Students will explore the natural world through topics such as plants and animals, weather, the five senses, and simple experiments. Indigenous knowledge about the environment and sustainable practices will be integrated to provide a holistic understanding of nature.

Social Studies

Children will learn about their community, family, and cultural diversity. Topics include community helpers, holidays, traditions, and basic geography. We will also explore Indigenous cultures, traditions, and contributions, fostering respect and appreciation for Indigenous heritage.

Art and Music

Creative expression is fostered through various art projects and music activities. Students will experiment with different materials and techniques, and participate in singing, rhythm, and movement. Indigenous art forms and music will be incorporated to celebrate cultural diversity.

Physical Education

Physical development is supported through activities that promote gross and fine motor skills, coordination, and teamwork. Regular exercise and outdoor play are integral parts of our program.

Social-Emotional Learning

We emphasize the development of social skills, emotional regulation, and positive relationships. Activities and discussions help children understand and manage their emotions and build empathy and cooperation.

Learning Goals

Our kindergarten program aims to achieve key developmental milestones and academic objectives that prepare students for future success. Here are the primary learning goals for the year:

Language Arts

- Recognize and write the letters of the alphabet.
- Develop phonemic awareness and basic phonics skills.
- Read simple words and sentences.
- Understand and retell stories, including Indigenous stories.
- Express ideas through drawing and writing.

Mathematics

Count to 100 by ones and tens.

- Understand and use numbers 0-20.
- Perform basic addition and subtraction within 10.
- Identify and describe shapes.
- Recognize and create patterns.

Science

- Observe and describe the natural world.
- Conduct simple experiments and make predictions.
- Understand basic concepts of weather, plants, and animals.
- Learn about Indigenous knowledge of the environment and sustainable practices.

Social Studies

- Identify community helpers and their roles.
- Understand family structures and cultural traditions.
- Recognize basic geographic features (e.g., land, water).
- Demonstrate respect for diversity and inclusion, with a focus on Indigenous cultures and traditions.

Art and Music

- Experiment with different art materials and techniques.
- Create original artwork and express creativity.
- Participate in singing, rhythm, and movement activities.

Immunization Requirements

Discipline Policy
